

olumbia's long-term plan for the old Manhattanville manufacturing area will revitalize the four former industrial blocks from 125th/129th to 133rd Street between Broadway and 12th Avenue, and three small blocks along the east side of Broadway from 131st to 134th Street, into an environmentally sustainable and publicly accessible center for academic and civic life woven into the fabric of the West Harlem community.

Project Scope

The initial phase of development will include the Jerome L. Greene Science Center, the Lenfest Center for the Arts, a new home for the Columbia Business School, and the University Forum. Later phases will emphasize interdisciplinary scholarship, including biomedical engineering, nanotechnology, systems biology, and urban and population studies, as well as housing for graduate students and faculty.

Current Construction Activity

Jerome L. Greene Science Center

Ongoing testing, balancing, and commissioning of mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems are nearing completion.

Lenfest Center for the Arts

Work substantially completed.

The Forum

Precast panels punch list. Roughing for mechanical, electrical and plumbing in the below-grade and street-level spaces. Masonry walls installation at the third level. Storefront frames and curtain wall frames are ongoing.

Phase 2 Foundations

The foundation contractor is currently performing the following activities: foundation minipiles, concrete pile caps, concrete pressure slab, and tiebacks. The dewatering system is in operation.

Central Energy Plant (CEP)

Boiler testing equipment setup and testing is ongoing. Training for systems is ongoing. Electrical system commissioning testing is ongoing.

Small Square

The first phase of Manhattanville's open space project, which lies north of W129th Street, south of Lenfest, and west of the Jerome L. Greene Science Center, is now open. Upcoming work will include planting of the perennials and remaining street trees.

Phase 1 Emergency Generator Project

Furnish and install emergency generator plant on the roof of the Studebaker building to provide emergency power to the

Manhattanville campus. Operations training is ongoing.

The Dormitory Authority of the State of New York supported the construction of the Jerome L. Greene Science Center with the issuance of Green Bonds. Gerrard Bushell, president and CEO of DASNY, recently joined Columbia officials on a walkthrough of the Jerome L. Greene Science Center and Lenfest Center for the Arts at Columbia University's new Manhattanville campus. DASNY helps to finance and build health care and education institutions throughout New York State, and it issued \$50 million in Green Bonds to help fund construction of the Greene Science Center, which received LEED Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council along with the Lenfest Center for the Arts. Construction Contracting

In the second quarter 2017 (April 1 to June 30), Columbia paid \$26,333,268 to MWL firms, representing 48 percent of total construction spend. \$22,497,536 of that figure was paid to local companies.

Cumulatively from August 1, 2008, through June 30, 2017, Columbia paid \$195,776,353 to MWL firms, representing 38 percent of total construction spend, excluding the amount paid to the construction manager. \$87,990,053 of that figure was paid to local companies.

Construction Workforce

In the second quarter 2017 (April 1 to June 30), the MWL construction workforce delivered 28,540 hours worked, representing 48 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 2,093 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Cumulatively from August 1, 2008, through June 30, 2017, the MWL

construction workforce delivered 1,380,208 hours worked, representing 50 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 245,501 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Columbia's Manhattanville Campus Awarded LEED Gold Certification for First Two New Buildings

The Jerome L. Greene Science Center and Lenfest Center for the Arts – the first two new buildings constructed at Columbia's Manhattanville campus – have been awarded LEED® Gold certification from the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) under the New Construction rating system.

LEED, which stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, is the foremost program for the design, construction and operation of green buildings.

"The LEED Gold certification for both new buildings brings to life the principles embodied in Columbia's Sustainability Plan in connection with one of the University's largest and most visible initiatives," said David M. Greenberg, executive vice president of Columbia University Facilities and Operations. "These building designations are concrete demonstrations of the University's culture of sustainability, and they reflect the standard of environmental commitment at Manhattanville for years to come."

The Jerome L. Greene Science Center and Lenfest Center for the Arts achieved the Gold certification through a broad spectrum of strategies, from leveraging site advantages to innovative designs to reducing energy demand, using sustainable construction techniques, selecting sustainable materials and more.

The Manhattanville campus is no stranger to LEED recognitions. The campus's environmentally sustainable design and overall project plan achieved Stage 1 LEED Platinum certification under the USGBC's Neighborhood Development pilot rating system—the highest designation in the rating system. It is the first such award in New York City and the first given to a campus plan anywhere in the U.S.

Among the sustainable construction and design elements of the buildings include:

- The double-skin aluminum and glass façade of the Jerome L.
 Greene Science Center creates a high-performance envelope that acts as an insulation blanket to help keep the building warm in the winter and cool in the summer.
- Maximizing the use of natural light and thermal temperature at the Greene Science Center, solar sensors on the roof work continuously to raise or lower perimeter shades for maximum

heating or cooling efficiency, and intuitive lighting controls regulate internal brightness to maximize natural light flow in the workspace and conserve energy.

- To help reduce the energy load for heating at the Greene Science Center, radiant heat is emitted from hot water, which circulates through tubing embedded in the concrete floor slab at the perimeter of each floor. In addition, air-handling units are equipped to recover heat from the exhausted air and add it to the supplied air.
- To reduce energy demand for air conditioning at the Greene Science Center, chilled water passes through chilled beams that are suspended from the ceilings at the perimeter of the floors and within the major open laboratory spaces.
- Maximizing select products from local and regional manufacturers within 500 miles of the project site and using recycled building materials reduced waste and minimized the University's carbon footprint when constructing the buildings.
- Encouraging alternative forms of transportation through proximity to mass transportation; shuttle bus service between campuses and transportation hubs; bicycle racks and bicycle share programs; and carpool programs helps to reduce the carbon footprint of occupants traveling to and from the buildings.
- Features of the Small Square open space, such as water efficient landscaping and the selection of native plants; lightcolored paving materials to reduce the heat island effect; and reclaimed wood for the fabrication of furniture and benches.

"While the LEED Gold designations should be celebrated by everyone affiliated with Columbia, the honors have added meaning to the members of our team whose hard work and unwavering focus on sustainability helped ensure the buildings received the recognition they deserved," said Marcelo Velez, vice president of Columbia's Manhattanville Development Group. "Many of the buildings' sustainability features were innovations in their own right, and I anticipate that some features will become models for scientific research buildings around the world, which are inherently high-demand energy buildings."

In addition, construction at Manhattanville follows a model clean construction program, which includes the prioritization of electric equipment over diesel equipment; the use of the latest diesel emission control technology for on road and off road equipment when diesel is required; a wheel washing system for trucks that uses a high volume of recycled water, and other efforts addressing air quality, noise and vibration reduction and pest management. Infrastructure improvements led to reduced wastewater overflow into the Hudson River by an estimated 1.5 million gallons per year.

Previously, interior renovations for a portion of the second floor of the Studebaker building received a LEED Silver designation for Commercial Interiors, and renovations of other spaces in the building are aiming to receive a Silver designation at a minimum. The Studebaker building is a former car finishing plant now retrofitted as an administrative building for Columbia University located within the Manhattanville campus.

Looking ahead to future construction in Manhattanville, Columbia University has committed to constructing all new buildings at the campus to LEED Silver certification, at a minimum.

Community Wellness Center for West Harlem Opens on New Manhattanville Campus



Dr. Olajide Williams, chief of staff of neurology and associate professor of neurology at Columbia University Medical Center, leads the InTOuCH program at the Wellness Center to raise awareness and prevent strokes, one of the leading causes of death and disability in the United States.

Two Columbia University Medical Center doctors are leading a new community Wellness Center, located at 610 W. 130th Street in the Jerome L. Greene Science Center on the University's new Manhattanville campus. Neurologist Olajide Williams, MD, and psychiatrist Sidney Hankerson, MD, are known for their pioneering approaches to improving public health in Harlem and Washington Heights. The Wellness Center will operate with support from Columbia's Mortimer B. Zuckerman Mind Brain Behavior Institute.

"When we committed ourselves to creating a new kind of open, accessible campus in Manhattanville, we knew it would be essential for Columbia to use this as an opportunity to deepen our partnerships with the local community," said Columbia University President Lee C. Bollinger. "Dr. Williams and Dr. Hankerson are rightly admired for the innovative work they have done to engage individuals, families and organizations in improving health and wellness in Harlem and Washington Heights."

The Wellness Center houses three programs: the Institute for Training Outreach and Community Health, *InTOuCH* program, Mental Health First Aid, and free blood pressure readings and cholesterol tests.

The Institute for Training Outreach and Community Health, InTOuCH, is designed to raise awareness about one of the leading causes of death and disability in the United States. The free program offers eight-week training sessions, to be held throughout the year that will give local residents the tools they need to become community health workers. Volunteers will learn about cardiovascular health issues, with a special emphasis on stroke and related risk factors. The first three cohorts of trained volunteers are well underway. Community members interested in participating in the program should contact the senior program manager, Harmon Moats, for an appointment by calling the Wellness Center at (212) 853-1147 or emailing hlm9@cumc.columbia.edu.

The program, modeled on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's training curriculum for community health workers, is led by Dr. Williams, chief of staff of neurology and associate professor of neurology at Columbia University Medical Center, founder of Hip Hop Public Health; and co-director of the Center for Stroke Disparities Solutions in New York. "I live in Harlem, I raised my children in Harlem, I have worked in Harlem my whole career as a neurologist, and I recognized the painful disparities that plague communities of color," said Dr. Williams. "I don't think that we, as physicians, will be able to realize the type of outcomes that our local communities desperately need if we do not venture out of the four walls of our hospitals. By extending our work through this new Wellness Center, we're fulfilling our fundamental responsibility as physicians and healers to our immediate community."

The Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is a program dedicated to improving access to quality mental health services in Upper Manhattan. To address the hurdles faced by African Americans and Latinos when it comes to getting mental health treatment, the program works with local faith communities, training leaders to identify and respond to signs of depression and other mental illnesses, as well as substance-use disorders like alcoholism and drug addiction. Dr. Hankerson, assistant professor of clinical psychiatry at Columbia University, College of Physicians & Surgeons and the New York State Psychiatric Institute, is directing MHFA trainings at the Wellness Center. His team will teach members of the community to combat the stigma often associated with mental health issues and help others seek medical care. Mental Health First Aid also provides mental health resources onsite at the Wellness Center. "The Wellness Center is going to be a hub for health in West Harlem," said Dr. Hankerson. "We know that people of color, African Americans and Latinos, are disproportionately affected by chronic medical conditions, such as high blood pressure, diabetes, depression, anxiety and stroke. Our goal is to promote education, awareness and engagement so people can get the help and healing that they need."

In addition to the stroke and mental health awareness programs, the Wellness Center also provides <u>free blood pressure readings and cholesterol screenings</u> to all who walk in at 610 W. 130th Street. Free walk-in screenings are currently available Monday to Friday,

9. a.m. to 5 p.m., with weekend hours anticipated in the future. Visitors are given records of their results, as well as information on ways they can improve their health. Wellness Center staff also offers information about free and low-cost clinical resources in the neighborhood and within the New York-Presbyterian/Columbia University Medical Center community. Printed materials and other resources are available in English and Spanish. Services at the Wellness Center are provided by ColumbiaDoctors.

The three offerings at the Wellness Center join other amenities on the ground floor of the Jerome L. Greene Science Center that are open to the public. The "Education Lab" at 609 W. 129th Street is a neighborhood-based resource for brain science education, supporting free public programs that harness the groundbreaking research of Columbia's Zuckerman Mind Brain Behavior Institute in creative and exciting ways for school children, science teachers, families, after-school groups and seniors.

The street-level Education Lab, which is designed to resemble Columbia's Zuckerman Institute's research laboratories, offers a variety of hands-on-brain science programs year-round. These programs include: Saturday Science, free monthly events held throughout the school year to explore the workings of the brain through hands-on activities and unique scientific resources; a Public Lecture Series and Teacher-Scholar Program that introduces middle and high school science teachers in New York City to cutting-edge brain science; Brain Research Apprenticeships in New York at Columbia (BRAINYAC), a program that provides an immersive science research experience in which high school students—primarily from upper Manhattan and the Bronx—train and work in Columbia neuroscience laboratories; and Community Brain Expo featuring scientific activities for all ages. These exciting programs are intended to provide the next generation of scientists and people of all ages with an understanding of brain science and how it applies to their everyday lives.

"This is going to be an amazing opportunity for collaborations, for the development of new partnerships between scientists, between physicians, between psychologists, and most importantly members of the West Harlem community to really identify how we can provide the best care delivered in a culturally sensitive way, and how we can positively impact the lives of people in West Harlem," said Hankerson.

Minority-, Women- and Locally Owned Businesses Grow with the Help of Columbia

Like any other small business owner, Anne Whitman, president and CEO of Hudson Moving & Storage Co., was so preoccupied with her company's day-to-day operations that a deep-dive reflection into her business seemed like a pipe dream. That's one reason why she jumped at the chance to join a business coaching program led by Columbia University created to help small businesses grow.

Hudson Moving & Storage Co. is one of 23 vendor companies that are part of the inaugural cohort of the CU Grow Executive Coaching program. CU Grow is a Columbia-initiated program designed to help minority-, women- and locally owned (MWL) vendors of the University grow their businesses.

Miranda, CU Grow program director and assistant director at Columbia University Facilities and Operations. "On many levels, the program's purpose is quite intuitive – finding more opportunities at Columbia and with large partner institutions for vendors that we are already working with, while also helping them grow their business for the future."

Over the course of the nine-month program, the coaches led the business owners through a curriculum developed by the Columbia University School of Professional Studies (SPS) designed to help vendors create a growth plan, connect them with resources to gain specific knowledge and review their overall business plan.

"Our goal in developing the program's curriculum was to have coaches use a field-tested, semi-structured model to think through a business's strengths, needs and priorities that would help participants evaluate their current business models and establish a growth plan to expand their horizons with confidence," said Will Cortes, director of Executive Education at Columbia University's School of Professional Studies. "The School of Professional Studies is proud to have developed a coaching curriculum that supports minority, women and local business owners and reflects Columbia University's focus on quality, value, and excellence."

Whitman of Hudson Moving & Storage was paired with coach Danielle Douglas of Inspire Enterprise who used the Columbia University SPS curriculum to collectively take a deep look into her business and identify areas for improvement. Since the time that the CU Grow program began, Whitman has already relaunched her company's website with mobile viewing in mind – a recognition that the world is far past the place where desktop computers are the dominant platform.

To Whitman, the business strategy was only the beginning of the program's benefits. "CU Grow has such a strong focus on fulfilling the name of the program – growing your business," she commented. "The networking opportunities go beyond building great relationships with purchasing representatives at Columbia and partnering organizations. We are building relationships with fellow program participants, where we are actively supporting and doing business with each other."

"It is fantastic that Columbia is reaching out to the community and to minority- and women-owned businesses and championing them through this program," she continued.

In addition to the capacity building and coaching, there is a strong emphasis to build vendor relationships with purchasers at Columbia and with University affiliates and partners in an effort to lead to more contracting opportunities. Program participants have the opportunity to participate in four procurement events over the course of the nine-month program, in addition to a presentation and Q&A from an executive in Columbia's procurement office.

To be eligible for the program, vendors must be certified minority- or women-owned business enterprises, or be based in Upper Manhattan or the South Bronx, have annual revenue between \$250,000 and \$5 million, and be an existing vendor of the University or provide a product or service in need at the University.

Since launching the program in February 2017, vendors in the CU Grow program have received more than \$12 million from Columbia University for services rendered (through November 2017).

University Facilities and Operations, creating the program was a logical step following the Corporate Alliance/Columbia University MWL Construction Trades Certificate Mentorship Program, which Facilities and Operations designed and implemented with five cohorts over the course of six years from 2008 to 2014. Firms that graduated from the mentorship program earned \$33 million in construction and maintenance spend with the University through December 2014.

"Once we had identified firms and helped to build their capacity over six years of the mentorship program, the natural outgrowth was to ensure that they were doing business across Columbia's six campuses and with Columbia's large institutional partners – all while continuing to refine their business strategies," said Pope.

In addition to the School of Professional Studies, the partnerships of other organizations with Facilities and Operations have been critical to the program's successful launch. The Harlem Commonwealth Council provides bi-weekly courses following a business development curriculum for vendors participating in CU Grow's Opportunity to Grow/ Capacity Building track. Vendors in this track have the same coaching sessions and participation in procurement events as the other CU Grow vendors, with the additional coursework on topics such as financing, marketing, pitching and other business skills.

"CU Grow is a logical extension of the business education and principles imparted during the previous mentorship program," said Robert Lopez, president of Blue Water Construction & Restoration Corp., a participant in the second cohort of Columbia's MWL Construction Trades Mentorship Program from 2009 to 2011. "In the time since we completed the mentorship program, our company has continued to find ways large and small to work with the University. Our participation in CU Grow offers our business another opportunity to expand our relationships across the University while we get to show our support and appreciation for Columbia's efforts to create these valuable, community-focused initiatives."

"What I love is how personalized this program is for the unique needs of each participating business," commented Quenia Abreu, CEO and founder of the New York Women's Chamber of Commerce, who is serving as a coach in the CU Grow program. "It is a complete program that brings all the pieces of the business puzzle together – including training, business coaches, city and state resources and contracting opportunities inside and outside of Columbia."

The first cohort concluded in late November with each vendor participant presenting their plan for growth in front of an expert panel, which was followed by a graduation ceremony.

The Lenfest Center for the Arts, the second new building completed at Columbia's Manhattanville campus, was recognized with a 2018 Merit Award in the Architecture category from AIA New York, the oldest and largest chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

The eight-floor, 60,000-square-foot Lenfest Center for the Arts, which opened in April 2017, was designed by Renzo Piano Building Architects, with Davis Brody Bond as executive architect, Body Lawson Associates — a Harlem-based certified Minority Business Enterprise — as associate architect and James Corner Field Operations as landscape architect for the Small Square open space.

The building features multiple venues for Columbia University's School of the Arts. The building includes four venues: the Miriam and Ira D. Wallach Art Gallery, which is free and open to the public; the 150-seat Katharina Otto-Bernstein film screening room; a flexible performance space; and a presentation space for readings, symposia, and seminars.

A largely monolithic massing – dictated by the program needs – the Lenfest Center appears to levitate above the highly transparent ground floor lobby, which becomes visually continuous with the

surrounding outdoor spaces. 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Minority, Women, and Local Businesses and Workforce

What Can Neuroscience Contribute to Economics? Seminar on May 7

Economics, psychology and neuroscience, among other disciplines, all have staked their claim to the study of decision-making. New technologies to examine human and animal brains alongside behavior — and the increased spatial and temporal resolution of those technologies in recent years — have brought these fields even closer together. Combining psychological and economic models with behavioral and neural correlates, Neuroeconomics is a burgeoning area of research that has grown exponentially in the past 15 years. Experts from a variety of fields have turned to neuroimaging, electrophysiology, EEG/EMG/EKG, and other neuroscientific tools to investigate and attempt to tease apart highly complex decisionmaking behaviors. This has led to a number of new breakthroughs in understanding how humans and other organisms ascribe value to, and calculate risk for, social, preferential, and ambiguous stimuli in their environments. What are the best uses of neuroscience in economics research, and how can these be further refined and improved upon? Does an increased emphasis on the neural correlates of behavior expand or limit the types of questions that are now investigated? What does the future hold for our understanding of the human mind, and what are the implications for economics and the decision sciences?

Columbia University celebrates opening of Community Wellness Center

On April 10, Columbia University celebrated the opening of its community Wellness Center in the Jerome L. Greene Science Center in West Harlem on Broadway at 130th Street. The event was attended by over 200 guests, including Columbia University President Lee C. Bollinger, Manhattan Borough President Gail Brewer, New York City Councilman Mark Levine, local public housing residents, Nobel Prize winner Dr. Eric Kandel and New York City Commissioner of Health and Mental Hygiene, Gary Belkin.

Physicians Olajide Williams and Sidney Hankerson will direct the Wellness Center. In remarks at the April 10 event, they outlined their vision for the range of care the Center will be able to provide to residents in West Harlem. Williams and Hankerson, a neurologist and psychologist respectively, are well known throughout the community for their pioneering approaches to improving public health in Harlem and Washington Heights.

Located on the ground floor of the Jerome L. Greene Science Center, the Wellness Center provides health resources to area residents. <u>ColumbiaDoctors</u> host community-based initiatives that train members of the Harlem community to become health advocates to prevent stroke and promote mental health. The center also provides free cholesterol and blood pressure screenings, health insurance enrollment, weight counseling, and other services. It operates with support from Columbia's Mortimer B. Zuckerman Mind Brain Behavior Institute. (Continued on page 3)

The Wellness Center's Community Health Worker Stroke Prevention program is designed to raise awareness about one of the leading causes of death and disability in the United States. The free program includes six-week training sessions held throughout the year to give local residents the tools they need to become community health workers. Volunteers learn about cardiovascular health issues, with a special emphasis on stroke and related risk factors. The program is led by Dr. Williams, chief of staff of neurology and associate professor of neurology at Columbia University Medical Center; founder of Hip Hop Public Health; and co-director of the Center for Stroke Disparities Solutions in New York.

"When we committed ourselves to creating a new kind of open, accessible campus in Manhattanville, we knew it would be essential to use this as an opportunity to deepen our partnerships with the local community," said Columbia University President Lee C. Bollinger.

"I live in Harlem, I raised my children in Harlem, I have worked in Harlem my whole career as a neurologist, and I recognized the painful disparities that plague communities of color," said Dr. Williams. "I don't think that we, as physicians, will be able to realize the type of outcomes that our local communities desperately need if we do not venture out of the four walls of our hospitals. By extending our work through the Wellness Center, we're fulfilling our fundamental responsibility as physicians and healers to our immediate community."

The Wellness Center is also home to Mental Health First Aid, a program dedicated to improving access to quality mental health services in Upper Manhattan. The program helps address the hurdles facing African Americans and Latinos when it comes to getting mental health treatment. Mental Health First Air works with local faith communities, training leaders to identify and respond to signs of depression and other mental illnesses, as well as substance-use disorders like alcoholism and drug addiction. Dr. Hankerson, assistant professor of clinical psychiatry at Columbia University, College of Physicians and Surgeons and the New York State Psychiatric Institute, will direct the program. His team will teach members of the community to combat the stigma often associated with mental health issues and help others seek medical care.

"The Wellness Center is a hub for health in West Harlem," said Dr. Hankerson. "We know that people of color, African Americans and Latinos, are disproportionately affected by chronic medical conditions, such as high blood pressure, diabetes, depression, anxiety and stroke. Our goal is to promote education, awareness and engagement so people can get the help and healing that they need."

The Columbia University Wellness Center is a community center: a safe space designed to support community health and wellness through partnerships and collaboration. To borrow the words of author and physician Mark Hyman, "the power of a community to create health is far greater than any doctor, clinic or hospital." Services at the Wellness Center will be provided by Columbia Doctors. Printed materials and other resources are available in English and Spanish.

Students Complete Mentorship Program under Guidance from Manhattanville Team

For the ninth year, members of Columbia's Manhattanville Development Group joined with its professional services partners in giving back to the community by mentoring a team comprised of high school students from across all five boroughs, including students from Columbia Secondary School and Frederick Douglass Academy, as part of the Architecture, Construction and Engineering (ACE) Mentorship program.

The program, which takes place over the course of the academic year, provides students with real-world exposure and access to the architecture, construction and engineering industries, and includes a city-wide contest where teams compete on various criteria as they develop plans and models for a simulated construction project.

This year's final presentation took place at Columbia University's Morningside campus. Students on the Manhattanville team presented designs for a theoretical project that would be located on the Large Square, a green space between the two buildings that will make up the Columbia Business School in Manhattanville.

The theoretical project — modeled after the U.S. Solar Decathlon—consisted of two, 1,200-square-foot sustainable housing prototypes. The homes were designed to have 50 percent of materials sourced locally, generate energy on-site, employ rainwater collection technology and water use/re-use strategies, and have energy-efficient heating and cooling systems (HVAC), appliances and electronics. The sustainable housing project allowed students to design a space familiar to them (i.e. a home) while also learning about various sustainable housing strategies.

The students were mentored by professionals at Columbia's Manhattanville Development Group, and architects, engineers and construction managers from Lendlease, WSP, Jaros, Baum & Bolles (JB&B), and Dattner Architects.

olumbia's long-term plan for the old Manhattanville manufacturing area will revitalize the four former industrial blocks from 125th/129th to 133rd Street between Broadway and 12th Avenue, and three small blocks along the east side of Broadway from 131st to 134th Street, into an environmentally sustainable and publicly accessible center for academic and civic life woven into the fabric of the West Harlem community.

Project Scope

The initial phase of development will include the Jerome L. Greene Science Center, the Lenfest Center for the Arts, a new home for the Columbia Business School, and The Forum. Later phases will emphasize interdisciplinary scholarship, including biomedical engineering, nanotechnology, systems biology, and urban and population studies, as well as housing for graduate students and faculty.

Current Construction Activity

Jerome L. Greene Science Center

The Building is in the final stage of closeout of trades, and is undergoing a phased occupancy plan.

The Forum

Installation of ceiling, ceramic tiling, flooring, permanent lighting and devices. Mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems completion and testing. Starting site work. Curtainwall at west elevation. Exterior GFRC.

Phase 2 Foundations

The foundation contractor is currently performing the following activities: steel erection and shear walls, concrete pile caps, concrete pressure slab, and importing drainage stone. The dewatering system is in operation.

A Campus Built for Sustainability

It isn't just the important scientific research and art produced and exhibited at Columbia University's new Manhattanville campus that will be cutting edge. From the outset, the 17-acre site in West Harlem was designed and built to be a model of sustainable architecture, urban design and clean construction practices.

The innovative campus plan—designed by Renzo Piano Building Workshop with Skidmore Owens and Merrill—was awarded a Stage 1 LEED-ND platinum certification for neighborhood development, the highest rating given by the U.S. Green Building Council. It is the first such certification in New York City and the first for a campus anywhere in the country. (LEED stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design.)

Among the campus features that helped earn that certification are proximity to public transportation, tree-lined pedestrian-friendly sidewalks, ample public open space, reduced energy consumption and a waste recycling program. The open, accessible campus is intended to provide a public amenity and enhance connections between the community and the renovated Harlem Piers Park west of Riverside Drive.

From its <u>Earth Institute</u> to its architecture school, Columbia is a globally recognized leader in academic research on climate change and sustainable development. "There is agreement from the top down, the University is committed to helping to protect our environment," said Wilmouth Elmes (SEAS'80), senior engineering advisor at Manhattanville. "The systems we put in place use less energy, less water and less electricity."

Community Amenities and Benefits

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Minority, Women, and Local Businesses and Workforce

Columbia has made a significant commitment to the minority, women, and local (MWL) construction contracting and workforce community throughout the course of the project: MWL construction trade contracting goal of 35 percent and MWL construction trade workforce goal of 40 percent. Working with construction contractors and the building trades, Columbia is working to enhance the role MWL firms and workers play in building the new campus. All figures represent non-specialty construction services and related materials.

Construction Contracting

In the fourth quarter 2017 (October 1 to December 31), Columbia paid \$41,168,110 to MWL firms, representing 64 percent of total construction spend. \$36,610,558 of that figure was paid to local companies.

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Construction Workforce

In the fourth quarter 2017 (October 1 to December 31), the MWL construction workforce delivered 49,387 hours worked, representing 51 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 4,827 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Cumulatively from August 1, 2008, through December 31, 2017, the MWL construction workforce delivered 1,485,063 hours worked, representing 49 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 257,517 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Did You Know?

Columbia University's new Jerome L. Greene Science Center in Manhattanville occupies land that in the early part of the 20th century was owned by Sheffield Farms, a historic private commercial endeavor that successfully addressed one of the most critical health issues of that time: the challenge of supplying healthy milk to expanding urban populations increasingly distant from rural dairy farms.

To commemorate this rich and largely unknown history of our community, Columbia has developed an exhibit called *Sheffield Farms, the Milk Industry, and the Public Good.* It's part of a broader understanding of this once-thriving industrial area that leads us to see Manhattanville as a true New York Nexus.

A central energy plant beneath the first two buildings open on campus, the <u>Jerome L. Greene Science Center</u> and the <u>Lenfest Center for the Arts</u>, reduces energy consumption by 27 percent compared to conventional systems.

It also minimizes the release of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere—a factor in climate change—as well as other pollutants. "There's a lot of stuff we would be breathing if we didn't do this," said Elmes. "We take that very seriously."



More than 90 percent of building materials from demolition at the new Manhattanville campus have been recycled, including longleaf pine, which the University has used to create reclaimed conference tables and other furniture.

The Greene Science Center, home to the Mortimer B. Zuckerman Mind Brain Behavior Institute, is one of the most energy efficient buildings in Manhattan, he said. Also designed by Renzo Piano, the building and its technical systems won a Diamond Award, the highest, from the American Council of Engineering Companies of New York. Its structure and systems are designed to reduce heat loss in winter and stay cooler in summer, with a building-management system that can respond to changing outdoor temperatures and energy use indoors. The double-glass exterior allows abundant natural light and virtually eliminates noise from the nearby elevated subway. The floors were reinforced to reduce vibrations from the subway that could damage sensitive scientific instruments.

At the outset of construction, the University worked with the Environmental Defense Fund to develop practices that contractors must use to reduce the impact on the environment and minimize disruption to the community. Every truck or crane that enters the site must use the latest pollution-control equipment, and idling motors are not permitted. As construction vehicles leave the site, their wheels are washed so dust isn't tracked through neighborhood streets.

"We know asthma is a problem in Harlem," Elmes said. "Practices like these could save a child's life." Other efforts to reduce the impact on the neighborhood and the environment include sound monitors around the site that ensure compliance with city noise codes. And construction waste is recycled, with recovered materials now being used in projects around the world.

Columbia-Harlem SBDC and Columbia Dining Partner to Launch the Uris Incubator Program

The Harlem Local Vendor Program (HLVP)—a partnership between the
Columbia-Harlem Small Business Development Center (SBDC),
Harlem Park to Park, Hot Bread Kitchen Incubates, Whole Foods

Market, and others—is designed to help manufacturers of locally made consumer goods increase their business acumen and capacity so that they may contract with more and larger retailers. Columbia Dining supports these local vendors with its purchasing power, having spent over \$100,000 to date, and is furthering its efforts and solidifying its commitment to local vendors through the launch of the Uris Incubator Program.

The new Uris Incubator Program connects select graduates of the HLVP to Columbia University students by selling their products at Blue Java Cafe at Uris Hall and hosting monthly demonstrations so that students can meet the producers and sample their new products. If successful, products will be expanded to other cafes throughout Columbia University, and in some cases they will be incorporated into student meals in dining halls.

While they are developing their products, HLVP participants have the opportunity to receive advice from Columbia MBA students with expertise in marketing, operations, and finance. In the spring, tables are set up weekly in Uris Lobby for HLVP business owners to learn about pricing, packaging, positioning, and promotion from their eventual customers, Columbia University students.

Students have continuously expressed a desire to buy local, sustainably sourced food and other products; sourcing from the HLVP is one of many opportunities that Columbia University has developed in response. Current vendors include Hot Bread Kitchen, which hires new Americans to bake breads that are used throughout the University Dining system; Spadét, a Green America–certified business that sells olive oil–based soaps and beauty products, available in restrooms in Faculty House and for sale at the Jerome L. Greene Science Center; Clean Plate Co., which sells the Hot Bread Kitchen Incubator–made (and often sold-out) smoked gouda macaroni and cheese in the Uris Blue Java Cafe; Kamuni Creek Beverages, Caribbean beverages using tropical super fruits; and Vy Higginsen's Mama's One Sauce, which can be found throughout campus dining halls.

\$25 Million of Contract Opportunities Open to Non-Union MWL Firms for Columbia Business School Project



Turner Construction Company, the construction manager for the Columbia Business School project at the Manhattanville Campus, has entered into a Project Labor Agreement (PLA) with the Building and Construction Trades Council and local unions to offer contract opportunities to non-union, minority-, woman- and locally-owned (MWL) firms in the Upper Manhattan Empowerment Zone area. The PLA creates coordinated work rules that allow construction to proceed with minimal disruption and keep all trades on schedule.

The PLA allows up to \$25 million in contracts to be completed by non-union MWL firms. Some of the trades designated for the non-union work include: early site work, millwork, temporary protection, flooring, paint, furniture, rough carpentry, electrical fit out, ceilings, ceiling carpentry, low voltage electric, HVAC west side fit out, HVAC air side fit out, tile/terrazzo and masonry. Non-union firms are able to use their own employees and are not required to assent to any union labor agreement to participate under this PLA.





Local High School Students Gain Hands-On Experience Through Internship Program at Columbia



Participants in the Columbia University Local Community High School Summer Internship Program. The program provides students with practical work experience across Columbia University Facilities and Operations.

After receiving over 11,000 responses to a university-wide survey measuring commuting habits of students, faculty, and staff, Columbia's Dan Allalemdjian needed to analyze the data and present key findings. Allalemdjian, director of transportation demand management for Environmental Stewardship, called upon Ibrahima Diallo – an incoming high school senior –to summarize data and create an executive summary to report the survey's key findings.

Diallo began working with Allalemdjian over the summer as part of the Columbia University Local Community High School Internship Program. The six-week program matches high school students with mentors across Columbia University Facilities and Operations to provide practical work experience before graduation.

During his internship, Diallo assisted Allalemdjian with transportation and commuter initiatives such as performing bi-weekly check-ups of Zagster, the university bike share system, and coordinating maintenance for any bikes in need of repair. He also helped the Environmental Stewardship team educate summer camp children on how to sort through recycling and waste at an event organized by the Manhattan Borough President's Office at Ralph Bunche School in West Harlem. "Ibrahima has been a great asset to the Environmental Stewardship team," said Allalemdjian. "His work helped us complete critical tasks to make decisions and create a fuller picture."

Community Amenities and Benefits

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Minority, Women, and Local Businesses and Workforce

Columbia has made a significant commitment to the minority, women, and local (MWL) construction contracting and workforce community throughout the course of the project: MWL construction trade contracting goal of 35 percent and MWL construction trade workforce goal of 40 percent. Working with construction contractors and the building trades, Columbia is working to enhance the role MWL firms and workers play in building the new campus. All figures represent non-specialty construction services and related materials.

Construction Contracting

In the first quarter 2018 (January 1 to March 31), Columbia reclassified a net amount of \$909,063 from MWL to non-MWL firms, representing money MWL firms paid to their non-MWL subcontractors, equivalent to 4 percent of total construction spend in the quarter. A net amount of \$4,348,626 was reclassified from payments made by local companies. This adjustment was due to a payment lag from MWL firms to their non-MWL subcontractors that occurred between previous quarters and this quarter.

Cumulatively from August 1, 2008, through March 31, 2018, Columbia paid \$248,964,959 to MWL firms, representing 41 percent of total construction spend, excluding the amount paid to the construction manager. \$126,932,414 of that figure was paid to local companies.

Construction Workforce

In the first quarter 2018 (January 1 to March 31), the MWL construction workforce delivered 38,372 hours worked, representing 53 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 3,579 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Cumulatively from August 1, 2008, through March 31, 2018, the MWL construction workforce delivered 1,523,624 hours worked, representing

49 percent of the total workforce hours for the construction of the new Manhattanville campus. 261,096 hours of that figure were performed by the local workforce.

Columbia's Apprenticeship Program Opens Doors for Employees

Ever since Mercedes Santana was a child, she enjoyed working with her hands. So it comes as no surprise that her natural proclivities and talents have served her well in progressing professionally at Columbia University Facilities and Operations – aided by the Facilities and Operations apprenticeship program.

Santana joined Facilities and Operations as a heavy cleaner in 2006, six years after she relocated to the United States from the Dominican Republic where she worked in accounting. While successful as a heavy cleaner, she knew she wanted to pursue other opportunities available. The right one came along when she learned of the Facilities and Operations apprenticeship program through a colleague.

Launched in 2016, the apprenticeship program was created for employees like Santana to learn skilled trades while establishing a needed pipeline of employees ready and prepared for the next opportunity at the University. The New York State Department of Labor lists maintenance and repair workers as an in-demand field in New York City, but there is a shortage of skilled workers to fill those positions due to retirement and fewer people entering the industry. Leaders at Facilities and Operations recognized this gap and took the initiative to create the apprenticeship program to train skilled workers to staff positions throughout the University, especially as new buildings open at Columbia's Manhattanville campus.

"Columbia's apprenticeship program is extremely vital not only to Columbia University, but the industry at large," said Phil Kretzmer, assistant vice president for Manhattanville Operations. "Our executive team recognized the need and committed time and resources to take action in creating the apprenticeship program. That proactive vision will be paying dividends to the high-level of operation of the University for years to come."

The apprenticeship itself is a competitive, seven-year program, funded by Columbia. Apprentices receive a combination of classroom education, on-the-job training, and mentorship by senior employees. Certified trade and technical schools along with leading industry providers conduct education, which takes place at both a dedicated training facility on Columbia's Manhattanville campus and off-site at professional venues as appropriate.

Apprentices begin the program by receiving exposure - in the classroom and on the job - to different trades, such as carpentry, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, masonry, and refrigeration. After successfully completing three years in the program, an apprentice is promoted to a maintenance worker and can choose a specific trade to pursue for their career. At the end of the program, an apprentice is well-prepared to fulfill open, skilled worker positions across the breadth of multiple campuses within the Columbia University network. The initial classes of apprentices are on track to graduate and be available for the next wave of new buildings at the Manhattanville campus, following the opening of the Forum.

"The apprenticeship program allows us to develop our own farm system, just like a baseball player rising through the minor leagues," said Lance Symons, executive director, Manhattanville engineering. "Apprentices are trained the Columbia way, meaning that they gain the needed skills along with the intangibles in order to provide the high level of service that we hold ourselves to."

Facilities and Operations worked with the TWU Local 241 executive board to bring the apprenticeship to fruition.

"The whole idea of the program was groundbreaking and we hadn't seen anything like it before. It reestablishes the trades and creates diversity," said Alex Molina and Dino Centrone, vice president and secretary treasurer of TWU Local 241, respectively. "The program is a great opportunity for new and existing employees to gain exposure to the trades and it encourages professional growth."

There are eight apprentices in the program out of thirteen current opportunities available as of August 2018. Facilities and Operations, in partnership with the TWU Local 241 executive board, are currently interviewing for the balance of open positions.

For Santana, Columbia's apprenticeship was the perfect opportunity to embark upon a new career path in an in-demand field and do something she would enjoy. With the support from her family, Santana enrolled in the program in January 2017. Her days were split between class and work at the Manhattanville campus, with her last assignment in the Central Energy Plant.

From just one year in the program, Santana had gained fundamental knowledge of the operation of a power plant, which boosted her confidence and inspired her to apply to a chiller maintenance position at Columbia's Morningside campus. Santana was offered the position and started in May, becoming the first woman to join the Chiller Plant team.

Not regretting her shift from accounting, Santana is proud to be in an environment where she can keep learning and growing, and entering a specialized field that is in high demand.

"I want my family and children to be inspired by my push to grow and advance. The apprenticeship program opened the door for me to do so in becoming a mechanic," Santana said, beaming with pride.
