Obligation

Community Scholars Program. Commencing with the acquisition by ESD or CU of all Initial Stage 1 Condemnation Parcels, and continuing for a 25-year period from commencement, CU shall offer independent, community-based scholars from Northern Manhattan access to a range of services provided by CU and resources not usually afforded to non-affiliated residents. Services and resources shall be provided at no cost to participants and shall include access to all of CU's libraries – including on-line access, course auditing privileges, dialogue with scholars in their field of study, and the ability to participate in seminars and social events developed specifically for the group of in buildings proposed within the Project Site. Selection shall be determined by an application process, reviewed by a committee of CU's faculty and leaders from relevant local cultural institutions. Scholars shall be appointed for 3-year terms. In the first year CU shall appoint up to five scholars; in the second year CU shall appoint up to an additional five, so that after year one there shall be a plan to have a cohort of ten scholars. CU envisions the program to proceed as a pilot for ten years and then be re-evaluated in good faith to assess its effectiveness.

*Planning activities were still ongoing upon the obligation trigger date. Appointments to the Community Scholars program began in 2013, one year after the trigger date. Therefore, this obligation will be in effect until 2038, 25 years from the commencement of the obligation implementation, after an assessment in 2023.

Celeste Lacy Davis: Putting together a comprehensive photographic exhibition focused on the current state of aging in America, with a focus on Harlem. The exhibition will incorporate personal narratives, public lectures, engaging seniors from Harlem in dialogue with gerontological scholars and grassroots organizers.

Janessa Waiters: Developing an organization to provide peer counseling, mediation, healing and social events for domestic care workers in Harlem.



GETTING THE COVID-19 VACCINE

Distribution of the COVID-19 vaccine in New York State is well underway. Right now, the following groups are eligible to receive the vaccine:

- Doctors, nurses, and health care workers
- People over the age of 65
- First responders, teachers, public transit workers, grocery store workers, and public safety workers
- People with certain medical conditions, including but not limited to obesity, cancer, heart conditions, neurological conditions, and diabetes

To schedule an appointment, use the New York State Am I Eligible app, available through covid19vaccine.health.ny.gov, or call the state hotline at 1-833-NYS-4-VAX. For seniors in Upper Manhattan, the Northern Manhattan Improvement Corporation has set up a hotline at 646-838-0319 from 9 AM to 4:45 PM on weekdays to assist with navigating the online scheduling system. The hotline is available in both English and Spanish.

Proof of eligibility, such as a photo ID with birthdate, pay stub, employee ID card, or doctor's note will be required at the appointment. For those with medical conditions, the option to self-certify is also available. There is no charge for the COVID-19 vaccine.



BARNARD STUDENTS LAUNCH COMMUNITY ARTS BIN

Last month, arts supplies became a little easier to find in Upper Manhattan thanks to Barnard College juniors Carolina Jimenez and Sheila Warrick, natives of Washington Heights and Harlem respectively, who were determined to make more creative resources available in their Upper Manhattan neighborhoods. They were surprised to see the arts often neglected in other mutual aid efforts around the city and country.

Inspired by the community fridges that have been popping up across the country to offer free fresh food, Jimenez and Warrick developed a community arts bin and stocked it with markers, paint brushes, yarn, sketchbooks, construction paper, and more as a no-cost resource for community members. To fill the bin, which is located in an auxiliary space run by Word Up Books in Washington Heights, Jimenez and Warrick secured donations from art supply retailers, including BLICK Art Materials, which has a location in Central Harlem.

Scholars typically work on a specific project or skill that they can improve or build out with the resources available at Columbia through the Bundles Scholars program, often with a connection to the community. Past and current scholars have worked on a wide variety of topics, including developing and expanding nonprofits that serve the neighborhood or the city, working on a biography of a historical figure or family member, answering a specific academic research question, and developing community outreach projects. Bundles Scholars can access a variety of academic and campus resources.* These include:

- Access to Libraries, including special collections and online access.
- Ability to audit a wide selection of courses
- University ID card
- University email address
- Access to university events and programs

Bundles Scholars do not receive a degree or credit towards a degree for the courses they take. To be eligible to be a Bundles Scholar, you must have a high school diploma, GED/TASC, or equivalent experience, and live in Manhattan north of 96th Street.

* Access to some campus and in-person resources is limited during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Program History

The Bundles Scholars program resulted from discussions with the West Harlem community, as part of Columbia University's community benefits and services related to the Manhattanville Campus Expansion. Its goal is to allow independent scholars and community members with scholarly interests to pursue their goals and benefit from a formal relationship with Columbia. The program is a joint initiative of Columbia's Office of Government and Community Affairs, the Office of the Provost, and the School of Professional Studies.

The first cohort, consisting of five scholars selected from a competitive field of applicants, began the program in the fall of 2013. Since then, four to five new scholars have been selected annually.

In June 2020, the program was renamed to honor Columbia University Trustee and program supporter A'Lelia Bundles.

▼ Section 3: Documentation

Please provide the following information to verify your eligibility and support your application.

- Résumé, or Curriculum Vitae
- Copy of your High School transcript, GED/TASC, **OR** explanation of equivalent experience. **(Required if no college transcript is submitted)**
- Copy of transcripts from any college or university work, if applicable. **(If you are submitting a transcript from an accredited university, you may omit your high school transcript)**

Note: If accepted into the program, official transcripts and proof of residency will be required.
