Obligation

Shuttle Bus Service for the Elderly and Disabled. Commencing on May 20, 2009, CU shall provide a shuttle bus service complying with ADA specifications to connect the Project Site to subway stations at 116th Street and Broadway, 125th Street and Broadway, 168th Street and Broadway and Harlem Hospital Center. The shuttle bus service shall be provided free of charge to members of the public who are disabled or who are senior citizens, including their attendants. The shuttle bus service shall run on a regular schedule throughout the day every weekday except State and Federal public holidays. If during this period the IRT subway station located at 96th Street and Broadway is made ADA accessible, CU shall provide shuttle bus service to connect this station to the locations above. The shuttle bus service shall be provided through 2033, but may be discontinued if and when the 125th Street IRT station becomes ADA accessible.

*The Obligation End Date is December 31, 2033, unless the shuttle bus service for the elderly and disabled is discontinued if and when the 125th Street IRT station becomes ADA accessible, per the obligation language above.

**EIGHTH AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT
BETWEEN THE TRUSTEES OF COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY
IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK AND ACADEMY EXPRESS, LLC**

EIGHTH AMENDMENT dated as of April 24, 2023 to the Agreement dated as of July 18, 2011 between THE TRUSTEES OF COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK ("Columbia"), a New York non-profit corporation, having an office at 411 West 116th Street, New York, New York, 10027, and Academy Express, LLC, having a principal place of business at 111 Paterson Avenue, Hoboken, NJ 07030 (herein referred to as ("Academy or Service Provider").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Columbia and Academy have entered into an Agreement, dated July 18, 2011 (the "Original Agreement"), and a First Amendment dated July 1, 2014 (the "First Amendment"), a Second Amendment dated July 1, 2017 (the "Second Amendment"), a Third Amendment dated July 1, 2019 (the "Third Amendment"), a Fourth Amendment dated September 4, 2020 (the "Fourth Amendment"), a Fifth Amendment dated February 10, 2021 (the "Fifth Amendment"), a Sixth Amendment dated August 25, 2021 (the "Sixth Amendment"), and a Seventh Amendment dated August 26, 2022 (the "Seventh Amendment") (collectively the "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Agreement grants to Academy the right to provide non-exclusive shuttle services to the Columbia community;

NOW THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree to amend the Agreement as follows:


1. Pursuant to Paragraph 10 of the Original Agreement and Paragraph 1 of the Second Amendment, Columbia hereby elects to renew this Agreement for an additional four (4) year term, through June 30, 2027.
2. To the extent that the terms and conditions of this Eighth Amendment revise, modify, supersede, conflict and/or revoke the terms and conditions of the Agreement, the terms and conditions of this Eighth Amendment shall control. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

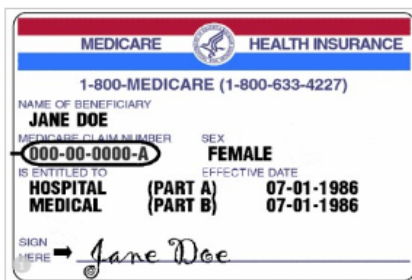

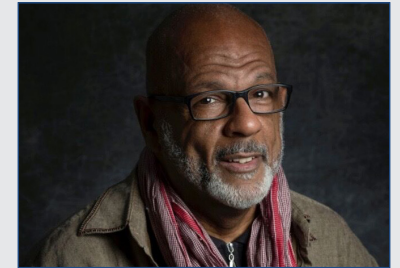

Double Discovery Center

Double Discovery Center Receives Federal Funding to Launch First-Gen Mentorship Program



The Roger Lehecka Double Discovery Center (DDC) recently announced new federal funding to create Project Start Right, an initiative aimed at reducing college attrition rates among underserved and first-generation communities throughout Northern Manhattan and West Harlem. DDC, first established in 1965, has been working with college-bound youth to help ensure their success to, through, and beyond their years as an undergraduate.

Thanks to U.S. Senators Chuck Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand, who shepherded \$388,000 in funding for the initiative through the FY'24 spending bill, this project will allow DDC to support first-generation students enrolled in colleges across the country.

“We are very excited to launch this new initiative, which we hope will become an important resource for our young neighbors throughout West Harlem, Washington Heights, and Inwood,” said Columbia University President Minouche Shafik. “Project Start Right will provide valuable counseling to young college enrollees from Upper Manhattan, with the goal of removing any obstacles that stand in the way of a completed college degree.”

A mentor at DDC and a Columbia student, Anthonella Fabiana Mendoza (CC'25) is on a mission to show local students their true potential.

The summer before her senior year, Mendoza experienced the power of mentorship when she received free college advising from the nonprofit, Matriculate. While her school's guidance counselors primarily promoted in-state options, her Matriculate mentor opened her eyes to a wider range of possibilities.

Mendoza aims to pay it forward in her mentorship role at DDC, where she began volunteering through a class she took called



“Equity and Access in Higher Education.”

“I was paired with two high school juniors as their mentor, and I still keep up with those students to this day,” said Mendoza.

“It's a full-circle experience because I'm providing them with the same support I received when navigating high school and the pre-college journey.”

Columbia's Mobile Health Clinic Hits the Road



Delivering health screenings and low-cost dental care to residents of Northern Manhattan and the Bronx, Columbia's mobile health clinic has increased its capacity with a \$500,000 grant from the Mother Cabrini Health Foundation.

The new and improved van integrates in-

frastructure for both primary medicine and oral health, featuring both a dental chair and a medical examination table.

The mobile clinic will travel to neighborhood schools, Head Start programs, day care centers, foster care facilities, nursing homes, rehabilitation centers, and health clinics in Harlem, Inwood, Washington Heights, and the South Bronx to provide on-site oral health care and preventive health services to children and seniors through Columbia's DentCare program.

Support for Parkinson's Caregivers at Columbia Neurology

Are you a caregiver for someone living with Parkinson's? Every first Wednesday of the month from 2:00 pm to 3:00 pm, a virtual support group at Columbia University Irving Medical Center is held to provide a supportive space for those taking care of a person with Parkinson's.

The Parkinson's Caregivers Support Group is free and open to anyone who is a caregiver. The group is facilitated by a passionate movement disorders team led by Erika Adelman, who spoke with *Neighbors* about the challenges experienced by caregivers and how the group can help.

“One thing we focus on is teaching people how to ask for help,” said Adelman. “This can be as simple as learning how to advocate for a loved one during doctor's appointments or, on a larger scale, how to

navigate the complex healthcare and social services system.”

Alongside the caregivers support group, the movement disorders team also leads other programs for Parkinson's patients to improve speech, reduce loneliness, and increase support.

Navigate Your Job Search with the Columbia Employment Information Center



The Columbia Employment Information Center will celebrate its 20th anniversary in 2025.

Near the Manhattanville campus—and a stone’s throw from the 125th Street subway station—sits a resource center for all job seekers.

The Columbia Employment Information Center (CEIC), which operates from Monday to Friday, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm, has welcomed nearly 58,000 individuals since its founding. It provides guidance on resumes, interview skills, and strategies for securing a job—both at Columbia and elsewhere.

At the heart of CEIC’s mission is a commitment to welcoming every visitor and providing tailored assistance to their job-search needs.

“We get really excited when people walk in,” said Barbara Catalano, executive director of CEIC. “We meet people at the door to figure out why they’re here and how we can help them.”

Though CEIC’s career resources are available to anyone who needs them, the team specializes in helping visitors apply for opportunities at Columbia.

“Open positions can run the gamut from a writer to IT positions, to administrative

work up at the Medical Center,” said Catalano. “We also work closely with Facilities on temporary maintenance needs like porters, door attendants, groundskeepers, locksmiths, and more.”

And though any job-seeker is welcome to take advantage of CEIC’s resources, its accessibility to the local community is key to its mission.

“Any visitor that walks through the door, regardless of where they live, is welcome and we help them equally,” said Catalano. “But we are in this location specifically for the local community. People really appreciate that we’re so accessible.”

Assistant IT Director Lamaka Opa Reflects on His Time at Columbia



While coming of age, Congo-born, Paris-raised Lamaka Opa was surrounded by examples of empowerment. His father was a physician who used the practice of medicine to uplift communities and his mother was an accountant who led microfinancing efforts to support women in purchasing land and building their own businesses. For Opa, who had an affinity for technology, those displays of service would remain a source of inspiration.

Upon moving to Harlem 16 years ago, Opa aimed to advance his career by finding employment at Columbia. However, the grueling job search and difficulties getting visibility proved frustrating.

Determined to change the course of his quest, Opa leaned on the resources and support provided by the CEIC, which was instrumental in helping his vision of working at Columbia become a reality.

With encouragement from Elizabeth Jones, the director of Community Employment Programs and Services at CEIC, Opa found open roles that fit his skills at Columbia and eventually landed a technician position in the surgery department

at Columbia University Irving Medical Center in 2015.

Now, Opa serves as assistant director of IT in Columbia’s Facilities and Operations (CUFO) department, and focuses

on ensuring others have a seat at the table through his work with the CUFO Equity and Inclusion Council.

Nearing his ninth year at Columbia, Opa reflected on his transformative experience at CEIC.

“The staff at the CEIC is very welcoming, professional, and friendly,” said Opa. “They smile at you. They want to know what you’re there for. It’s positive. I haven’t been there for years, but that’s what stays with me. It’s really important, especially in a time when society is lacking human connection.”

Are you a Manhattanville resident seeking legal aid to prevent an eviction, preserve affordable housing, or address safety hazards in your residence?

Columbia University has contracted with P.A.L.A.N.T.E. Harlem to provide two attorneys to work on anti-eviction and anti-harassment legal assistance for residents of the Manhattanville area.



Attorneys help residents:

- Remain in their apartments
- Overturn illegal rent increases
- Identify unhealthy conditions
- File housing code violations

- Present findings with landlord and engage them in renovations

Reach out directly to P.A.L.A.N.T.E. Harlem

- 1 Call (212) 491-2541 for a brief phone intake to discuss concerns with a housing specialist.
- 2 After intake, P.A.L.A.N.T.E. will set up an appointment with an attorney to discuss the case at length.
- 3 Bring necessary documents. This may include rent registration history, lease or proprietary lease, and court documents (if already court-involved).



Visit the Community Board 9 Office

- 1 P.A.L.A.N.T.E. is present at Community Board 9's office, every first Thursday of the month from 1:00 pm to 5:00 pm.
- 2 Residents can meet one-on-one with an attorney—no appointment required—but are encouraged to bring documentation on first visit.
- 3 A follow-up appointment will be set with P.A.L.A.N.T.E. to discuss the case at length.

Uptown Night Market Returns for Its Fourth Season in West Harlem



Summer in the city means the return of street festivals, and West Harlem is lucky to host one of the city's largest, Uptown Night Market. The event is held every second Thursday of the month from April to October, from 4:00 pm to 10:00 pm, under the viaduct arches at West 133rd St. & 12th Ave.

Central to Uptown Night Market's mission is a determination to empower and uplift communities like Harlem. In an interview with *Neighbors*, founder Marco Shalma shared his desire to serve the community and support local businesses.

"Our mission from day one has been to support communities that otherwise were ignored before and support small businesses that are representative of who we are," said Shalma. "We wanted to do

something that served communities in a way that feels organic."

When it came time to find a home for Uptown Night Market, it was no question to Shalma that the West Harlem viaduct was the perfect place.

"The scenery lends itself so beautifully. It's just such a beautiful iconic setting," said Shalma. "I've always wanted to do something in that area to showcase it to people. It's a symbol of Harlem and Harlem is a symbol of New York. That's why I thought hosting it along 12th Ave. would be iconic."

Columbia University Shuttle Rider Guidelines

Columbia University's Shuttle system exists to serve active faculty, staff and students of Columbia University and Columbia Irving Medical Center. This is not a public transportation service, it has been [designed to serve the needs of our Columbia community](#).

Guidelines for Riding the Shuttle

- Upon boarding one of our shuttles the driver will ask you to tap your Columbia University ID card/CUIMC ID card on the card reader.
- Seating is available on a first-come-first-served basis.
- Seats marked "Priority Seating" are intended for seniors, pregnant women, people with disabilities, or others with a physical need to sit down for the duration of the commute. Please relinquish these seats if someone is in need. Disabilities may not be visible. Do not ask riders to share personal medical information if they request a seat.
- Please do not save seats when seating availability is limited. In these instances, it is also not appropriate to take up two seats (with baggage or otherwise). Please respect the rights of others to the seat next to you.
- As a courtesy to the passengers boarding, please use the rear exit to debus.
- Drivers can only stop at designated stops, you can alert the driver that you are off-boarding on the next stop by ringing the bell (the yellow cord by the windows.)
- Loud conversations and phone calls can be distracting. The shuttle is a great time for interacting with colleagues and friends but please be mindful of the shuttle environment and the volume of your conversation. If you must use your cell phone, please make the call brief and use a quiet voice.
- Guests, including spouses, are not permitted to use the shuttles unless they are a University ID card holder. Children under 18 are welcome to ride, but must be accompanied by an adult - the University ID card holder. Children should be seated in bus seats with their seatbelt fastened throughout the commute. Strollers should be collapsed to allow safe passage through the aisles for other patrons. Parents are responsible for the well-being of their children while on a Columbia shuttle.
- Riders can track the shuttle's location in real-time on the [Passio GO app](#). Download the app to view all Columbia shuttle routes, including the Fort Lee, Lamont, Manhattanville Loop, and Intercampus Red, Blue, and Green routes, via smartphone.
- Real-time emergency communications, such as a missing or disabled bus, bad traffic, weather, or an impaired driver should be communicated to our service team by calling 212-854-3382.
- Any issues, complaints or recommendations that can be addressed on a non-emergency basis should be communicated by e-mail to our team at transportation@columbia.edu. Your message will be kept confidential.
- You can also use the Passio app to provide feedback to our team, make a suggestion and/or report a concern by clicking on upper left tab once you open the application, then selecting the suggestions tab.

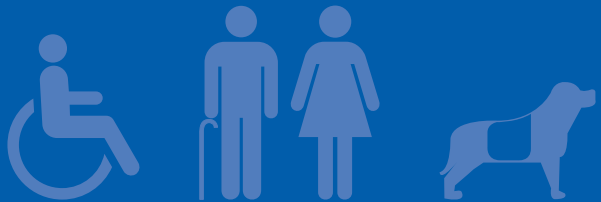

What is the Community Shuttle?



Columbia University provides free bus shuttle service for the community, Monday-Friday, 9 AM – 5 PM Shuttle service runs year-round, with a more limited schedule in the summer.

Who Can Use the Shuttle?



The shuttle is wheelchair accessible and free for people with disabilities, the elderly and their companions, as well as individuals with service animals.

How do I Identify the Shuttle?



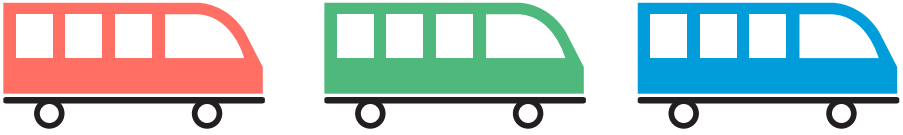
Shuttle service runs via the Columbia Intercampus Shuttle. Look for the **Columbia Community Shuttle** decal next to shuttle doors. This identifies the Intercampus Shuttle for your use.

Where Does the Shuttle Stop?

The shuttle connects 96th Street, the Morningside campus, the Medical Center, and Harlem Hospital with stops at the following locations near subway stations:

- **Columbia University Irving Medical Center**
- **Harlem Hospital**
- **125th Street & Broadway**
- **116th Street & Broadway**
- **96th Street & Broadway**

Red, Green, or Blue?



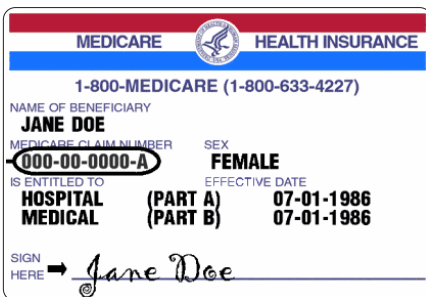
During the Academic year, the route is serviced by three shuttle buses designated as Red, Green, and Blue. You'll see these colors used on the shuttle map on page 6 and the shuttle timetables on pages 9-15.

You can tell which bus is at your stop from the display on the front of the bus. During the summer, the route is serviced by one bus without any color designation.

Do I need an ID to ride the shuttle?

All riders must present a valid ID upon boarding the shuttle. Accepted IDs:

- **Medicare Health Insurance Card**
- **Access-A-Ride ID Card**
- **MetroCard for Senior Citizens or People with Disabilities**

How do I reach frequent destinations?

Columbia University Irving Medical Center

- From 96th, 116th, and 125th Streets, ride the **Red, Blue, or Green shuttles**.

Harlem Hospital

- Service to Harlem Hospital is provided via the **Green shuttle** only.

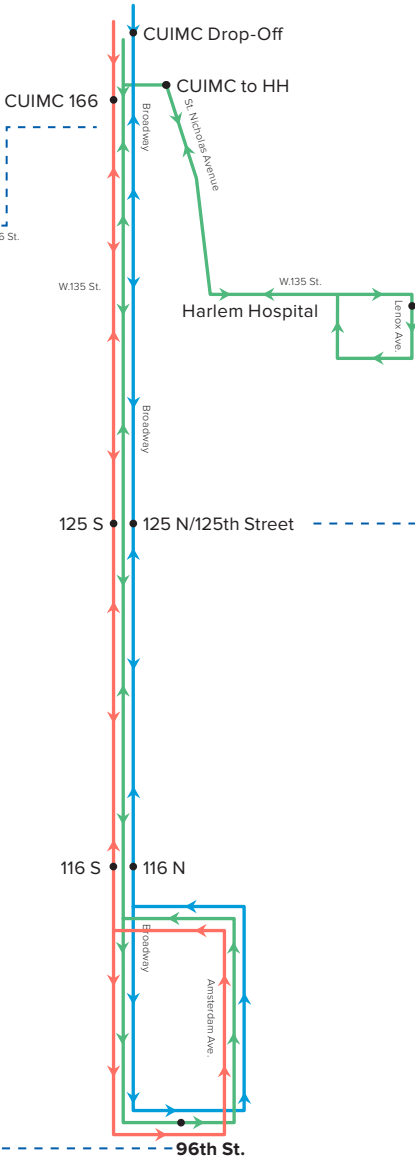

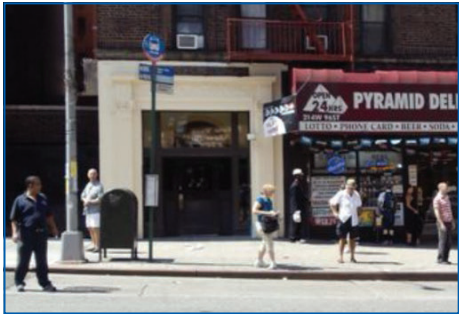
We have updated some of our stop locations to conform with DOT/MTA regulations please look for signage at MTA bus stop locations that state “Columbia University Shuttle.”
